Wheat... Weeds... No Worries The Parable of the Tares Pastor Carl Toti July 25-26, 2015

Matthew 13:24-30 (NLT)

²⁴ Here is another story Jesus told: "The Kingdom of Heaven is like a farmer who planted good seed in his field. ²⁵ But that night as the workers slept, his enemy came and planted weeds among the wheat, then slipped away. ²⁶ When the crop began to grow and produce grain, the weeds also grew. ²⁷ "The farmer's workers went to him and said, 'Sir, the field where you planted that good seed is full of weeds! Where did they come from?' ²⁸ "An enemy has done this!' the farmer exclaimed. "'Should we pull out the weeds?' they asked. ²⁹ "'No,' he replied, 'you'll uproot the wheat if you do. ³⁰ Let both grow together until the harvest. Then I will tell the harvesters to sort out the weeds, tie them into bundles, and burn them, and to put the wheat in the barn.""

A parable is an earthly story with a spiritual and, at times, prophetic meaning.

Galatians 6:7-8 (NKJV)

⁷ Do not be deceived, God is not mocked; for whatever a man sows, that he will also reap. ⁸ For he who sows to his flesh will of the flesh reap corruption, but he who sows to the Spirit will of the Spirit reap everlasting life.

Jesus gives the interpretation of the parable— *Matthew 13:36-43 (NLT)*

Then, leaving the crowds outside, Jesus went into the house. His disciples said, "Please explain to us the story of the weeds in the field." Jesus replied, "The Son of Man is the farmer who plants the good seed. The field is the world, and the good seed represents the people of the Kingdom. The weeds are the people who belong to the evil one. The enemy who planted the weeds among the wheat is the devil. The harvest is the end of the world, and the harvesters are the angels. The Son of Man will send his angels, and they will remove from his Kingdom everything that causes sin and all who do evil. And the angels will throw them into the fiery furnace, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth. Then the righteous will shine like the sun in their Father's Kingdom. Anyone with ears to hear should listen and understand!

1. WHAT DO YOU SEE?

A world filled with wheat where weeds are growing or a world filled with weeds where wheat is growing?

2. WHEAT vs. WEEDS

- 1) The difference between wheat and weeds is that wheat is always in the row that you planted it.
- 2) Wheat follows the rules, as it were, obeys the farmer's commands, grows where the farmer has planted it.
- 3) Wheat multiplies only by planting.

3. WHAT ARE YOU GROWING?

- Find your row and GROW. Bloom where you are planted.
- Be a Psalm 1 tree.
- Let your influence shade out or deprive the weeds of sunlight and water they need to survive.
- Don't be a stalk of wheat in a field by yourself. Grow with others in a community of wheat.
